2020 will mark a number of 75th anniversary milestones in World War II. Iwo was a first in that it was Imperial Japan Territory. It was another strategic step that would lead up to the anticipated invasion of the mainland. The invasion of Iwo Jima began 19 February, 1945 but little discussed is that bombardment activities of the island began six months earlier in August of 1944. Art Delmore the S-2 of the 30th Bombardment Group and their aircraft captured valuable intel on the island while they bombarded installations and the airfields. A few photos are found in this issue.

Also in this issue we honor a couple other servicemen. First was a member of the 8th Air Force Bomber Command and the second was a 36th Infantry Division Silver Star recipient who later went on to become a Brigadier General.



This is the fatigue shirt and plaque for Brigadier General Theodore Andrews who served for 33 years. From Caldwell, Texas he graduated from Texas A&M in 1938. He was with the 143rd Infantry Regiment of the 36th Infantry Division during World War II where he received the Silver Star for gallantry in action. During his distinguished career he also had posts with 7th Army and the 1st Infantry Division.

Theodore Andrews



THEODORE H. ANDREWS, 0365318, Captain, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 11 December 1943 in the vicinity of ***, Italy. Captain Andrews commanded Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion, while the battalion was in a defensive position in the mountains near ***. For four days the Battalion Command Post had been subjected to fierce enemy artillery and mortar fire. The Battalion communications officer and the Battalion S-3 both were wounded and evacuated, whereupon Captain Andrews assumed the responsibility of these positions in addition to the adjutant's duties. Exposed to heavy artillery and mortar fire, he checked positions and communication lines, kept his linemen on the job, and at all times had communications with all echelons. During a heavy enemy barrage on the command post, he was completely buried with dirt and rocks thrown into his fox hole. After being dug out he immediately walked among his men giving them encouragement and coordinating his command. All of his officers were wounded and evacuated, but he carried on, keeping control of his company and maintaining their positions, thus materially assisting the battalion to consolidate its forces and take its objective. His courageous, gallant and aggressive leadership under enemy fire greatly inspired his men. His gallant action reflects great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered the Service from Caldwell, Texas.



IWO JIMA. 1. Five Jap LSM's (1064 ft Landing Ship Medium) used to supply and reinforce Iwo; these were damaged and beached at various times beginning in August. 2. Jap destroyer damaged and on the beach as a result of the naval shelling. A rough line from the LSMs along ridge was the Jap main line of resistance; the high ground along cliffs to left of LSMs concealing many heavy guns and mortars which brought enfilade fire on the landing beach.
